

he Field of the Year Awards will be presented January 17 at the Sports Turf Managers Association's (STMA) 14th Annual Conference and Exhibition Awards Banquet in San Antonio. The Awards are presented for top maintenance of natural playing surfaces and support facilities in baseball, softball, football, and soccer and are the highest honor STMA bestows upon a facility.

STMA is a not-for-profit international association of more than 2,400 sports turf professionals from schools, colleges and universities, parks and recreation and municipal facilities, and professional stadiums; from research, teaching and cooperative extension personnel; and representatives of commercial affiliates who unite in promoting better and safer sports turf areas. The association and its affiliated chapters collect and disseminate scientific, educational and practical knowledge on the science of growing grass and the art of maintaining sports turf to produce safe and aesthetically pleasing playing surfaces. The Association and its membership are focused on a common goal: Providing the best sports surfaces for all levels of play.

Field of the Year entrants must supply information on the design of the facility, the uses of the facility that impact the playing surface, the organization of the maintenance program and innovative solutions used to overcome playing surface problems. Photos of specific areas of the field must be provided to document the playability and appearance of the playing surface.

Each of the five judges on the Awards Committee review the entrants independently, grading them on each aspect of the criteria. The results of the independent input of the five judges determine the winning field.

This too was expanded upon during the tour as the he and the FIU sports turf staff gave a mound repair demonstration and discussed preparing the field for play after a rain event.
