
FIELD OF THE YEAR



April and May when we have either the Isotopes or the Lobos playing games almost every day. I do the best I can during the season and am getting better at taking more time for myself and my family during the offseason. I have learned that the job is more enjoyable when you take the time to "recharge the batteries" during the slow months and when you find time away from the park during the busiest months.

Sports Turf: Do you plan any adjustments to your maintenance plan

in 2008? Did you purchase any new equipment or product for this year?

Alley: I am planning on doing more deep solid tine aerification [1/2 x 6-inch+) during the season and pulling fewer cores. In the past we have cored up to three times during the season and with such a tight window for performing maintenance I feel like we have sometimes done more harm than good. We will pull cores once during the season (probably June based on our schedule) and then 1-2 times in the fall when the season is over.

We will try to solid tine the field in March/April depending on weather, once in May and once in July. One of the core aerations during the fall (end of September) will be performed with 8 inches deep by ¾-inch hollow tines. We have been using a Broyhill Stadium 80 sprayer, but will be working to upgrade to a more efficient option. We used more foliar applications last year and would like to continue that trend in 2008, but it will depend on the type of sprayer we are able to get approved.

SportsTurf: What's the greatest pleasure you derive from your job? What's the biggest headache?

Alley: I enjoy being outdoors, working with my hands, and have a passion for the game of baseball. This job allows me to combine all of those on a daily basis. In 8 years as a sports turf manager I have never agonized over going to work and think if you can achieve that in your profession it can only lead to happiness in your personal/family life.

The biggest headache for baseball field managers is the weather. People always act as though we have control over it and/or have a magic

ball to determine and explain exactly what it will do at any given time. Also, we never seem to be pleased with what the weather is doing.

> When the team is on the road we want it to rain (it doesn't), when the team is at home we want it dry (it rains), and no matter what the conditions are for the day when you pick up a hose the wind starts blowing—directly into your face no matter which direction you are facing.

> SportsTurf: How do you see the sports turf manager's job changing in the future?

> Alley: I see the sports turf manager's job being more easily recognized as the professional position that it has become. As we continue to educate the people we work with and for, I feel that we will eventually get to a point where professionals are expected in all of these positions.

> I hope to see the time where everyone can understand the importance of our knowledge and dedication to the sports that we service. Such as how people understand the importance of an emergency room doctor. Most people don't know what exactly an ER doctor does on an hourly or daily basis, but they do understand and respect just how critical they are to the medical profession.

> The continued efforts of all sports turf managers will help to grow our profession into one that can be recognized as a necessity for sports of all levels and abilities.

Spray AgriPlex and Iron at 3 oz/1000 Spray Roots and Iron at 3 oz/1000

Core aerate entire field and topdress (30 tons sand)

July: .65 lb N/1000, 1.25 lb K/1000, 1 lb Mg/1000

Perk (4-0-10) at 1 lb Fe/1000 Spray Roots and Iron at 3 oz/1000 Spray 7-0-1 and Iron at 3 oz/1000

Deep tine field (1/2-in.x 6-in. solids) and topdress

August: .75 lb N/1000, 1 lb K/1000 Spray AgriPlex and Iron at 3 oz/1000 Spray Roots and Iron at 3 oz/1000

September: .92 lb N/1000, .24 lb K/1000, 1 lb K/1000

Spray AgriPlex and Iron at 3 oz/1000 Spray Roots and Iron at 3 oz/1000 Overseed infield, aprons, and poa spots

Condress (10 tons sand)

Topdress (10 tons sand) Wash out all edges Overseed landscape areas

October: 2 lbs N/1000, 1 lb P/1000, 3 lbs K/1000

Spray Roots and Iron at 3 oz/1000 (twice) Laser grade infield and warning track

Deep tine field (3/4-in. x 8-in. cores) and topdress (60 tons)


Renovate all mounds

Raise mowing height to 1.75 in.

November: 1.5 lbs N/1000, .5 lb P/1000, 3 lbs K/1000

STMA Conference attendance up 20%

he 19th annual Sports Turf Managers Association (STMA) Conference and Exhibition broke several records for attendance, bringing more than 1,800 total participants to Phoenix January 15-19, a gain of nearly 20% in total attendance from last year's conference.

STMA's Seminar-on-Wheels program also experienced tremendous growth. Typically drawing 75 attendees per tour, this year saw 111 and 356 participants, respectively, for Tuesday's and Wednesday's tours. The first tour stopped at two stadiums, a soccer complex, a thoroughbred horse racing complex and a turf sod farm. In addition to a multi-use sports complex and a baseball park, the second tour visited Chase Field that has a unique retractable roof, and the University of Phoenix Stadium, which was the game field for this year's memorable Super Bowl.

Integral to the conference was the 100,000 sq. ft. exhibition that showcased the sports turf industry's products, services and equipment. More than 165 companies displayed the newest innovations in turf-related products. New on the trade show floor this year was the building of a regulation-size pitcher's mound. Led by minor league head groundskeeper Chris Ralston with Lake Elsinore Storm Baseball, the mound-building provided a unique learning experience for attendees.

Sixty-eight educational sessions and workshops, roundtable discussions, and a hands-on training session hosted by MLB/NFL/MLS turf managers were packed into the 4-day conference. The conference events were enhanced by the support of Barenbrug; Beacon Athletics; Covermaster; Cygnet Turf & Equipment; Diamond Pro; Ewing Irrigation; Hunter Industries; Jacobsen, A Textron Company; Kubota; Midwest Rake; Pro's Choice; The Toro Company; Turface Athletics; West Coast Turf; and World Class Athletic Surfaces.

STMA highest honors presented

The STMA Awards banquet culminated in the awarding of the Founders Awards, STMA's most prestigious honors. Donald Fowler, retired Penn State Cooperative Extension agent, received the Dick Ericson award, which is given to a sports turf manager who positively

He was instrumental in organizing the STMA-affiliated chapter, KAFMO, and since 1996, he has been the lead organizer of the group of volunteers who work the Little League World Series.




Dr. Mike Goatley

STMA board member Bob Curry of Covermaster. The Gill Award recognizes an individual for their hard work in the sports turf industry and acknowledges their dedication and service to the STMA. Curry has been a long time supporter and promoter of STMA and the sports turf profession within the U.S. and internationally. In STMA's lean years, he paid for board members expenses to board meetings to help out the cash-strapped organization and played an integral role in the STMA headquarters transition from outside management to its own staff, devoting much of his personal time to making the transition seamless.



Students compete in 4th Collegiate Challenge

Students were able to take advantage of many activities specifically geared to them including two forums and the Fourth Annual Student Collegiate Challenge presented in partnership with the SAFE Foundation and Platinum Sponsor Hunter Industries. Through the generosity of SAFE, the Student Challenge provides the winning two-year team and the winning four-year team each with a \$4,000 grant to fund a practical

learning lab at their college or university. Ninety-nine students comprising thirty teams from various colleges and universities participated in a multiple choice exam on athletic turf and sports field management topics and identified plants, insects, diseases and weeds, as well as a written case study. Twenty-six teams competed in the event in 2007. Hunter Industries' continued sponsorship picks up the tab for all Student Challenge competitors STMA Conference registration.

The winning team from the 4-year competition was The Pennsylvania State University Team 008, whose members were Matt Naedel, Tanner Del Valle, Mark Peasley, and Matt Elmore. Iowa State University Team 010 came in second and Iowa State Team 003 came in third.

In the 2-year program, The Pennsylvania State University Team 104 took top honors, with teammates Josh Dubbs, Blaise Restifo, Robert Finnegan, and Andre Aymar. Second place went to Michigan State University Team 103 and third place was taken home by Mt. San Antonio College Team 101.

The two first place teams also received the Student Challenge Cup and individual medals. Second and Third place winners received certificates and medals.




